

In-form India staying focused despite off-field turmoil

Dhoni's men are looking to top their group with a win against underperforming Australians, who are staring at early exit

MIRPUR: India captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni insists his side have had no problem focusing on the World Twenty20 despite the controversy surrounding cricket in the country.

A Supreme Court investigation into allegations of corruption at the Indian Premier League has been ongoing during the tournament, with BCCI president N

Srinivasan forced to temporarily step down from his role as a result. There was also a proposal that Dhoni's franchise Chennai Super Kings, as well as Rajasthan Royals, would be suspended from this year's IPL, though that is now off the table.

Against this turbulent background, India have progressed serenely on the field, cruising to three successive wins and becoming the first side to seal a semi-final slot. They finish their Group 2 campaign against an underperforming Australia side on Sunday, with Dhoni happy his team can continue keeping their eye on the prize.

McCullum powers **Kiwis to** easy win

CHITTAGONG: Captain McCullum's Brendon 65 powered New Zealand to a six-wicket win against the Netherlands and kept their hopes alive for a semi-final spot from Group One in the Ŵorld Twenty20.

The Kiwis reached their 152-run target with an over to spare to bring up their second victory in three matches in the super 10 stage. McCullum, the most prolific run-scorer in the shortest format of the game, hit four boundaries and three sixes during his 45-ball knock, also bringing up his 13th half century in T20 internationals. The 32-year-old, who became the first batsman to cross 2,000 international runs in the format, stitched together meaty stands with Kane Williamson (29), Ross Taylor (18) and Corey Anderson (20 not out) to make it a comfortable chase for his side.

Earlier, captain Peter Borren compiled his highest T20 score of 49 to anchor the Dutch innings and take them to 151 for four wickets after being put in to bat. The 30-year-old hit seven fours and a six during his 35-ball knock and added $6\overline{0}$ for the fourth wicket with Tom Cooper (40 not out) to give the Netherlands some momentum after a slow start. Cooper hit four boundaries and two sixes during his 23-ball unbeaten stay at the wicket but New Zealand pulled things back with some miserly bowling in the death overs.

England bow out of contention after three-run loss

193-7 at Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury stadium. South Africa are the second team to qualify for the semis after 2007 champions India cruised to the last four from Group Two.

The defeat, their second in three Group One Super-10 matches, sent 2010 champions England out of the semi-final race. Sri Lanka meet New Zealand in their last Group One match on Monday and the winners will join South Africa in the last four. Pakistan meet Bangladesh in a Group Two match in Dhaka on Sunday and if the 2009 champions beat the hosts, their last match against title-holders the West Indies will decide the last semifinal berth.

De Villiers was happy at the much-needed win. "It was a great the did extremely

unpredictable and mix things up. But once again the execution of the bowlers was amazing."

Stuart Broad said his players were heartbroken. "It's a fantastic game, credit to the players for that, we're heartbroken to come out on the wrong end but AB took the game away from us. "It didn't go to plan in the last three overs but apart from that it was a good game for us."

England, who chased down a 190-run

target against Sri Lanka on Thursday, failed to match that performance with Alex Hales (38), Jos Buttler (34) and Ravi Bopara (31) unable to benefit from good starts. Parnell, who was released from the squad for two days to



attend a court hearing relating to drugs charges in the 2012 Indian Premier League in Mumbai on Friday, dismissed Michael Lumb (18), Hales and Moeen Ali (10) to jolt England after they got off to a 46-run start by the fifth over. Hales hit six fours and a six off 22 balls but once he departed the target continued to climb with 45 needed off the last three overs and 22 off Dale Steyn's final over.

South Africa's total was built around a swashbuckling 28-ball 69 not out by De Villiers and a 37ball 56 by Amla. De Villiers was ruthless in the final overs, taking 26 off Jade Dernbach's 18th over and reached his 50 with a towering six. In all he hit nine fours and three sixes to help South Africa during an innings stopped twice for floodlight failure. South Africa smashed 75 in the last five overs.

Amla and Quinton de Kock (29) helped South Africa to 90 without loss in the 11th over with the former in a punishing mood. The bearded Amla hit six fours and two sixes before he was caught at deep mid-wicket off Stuart Broad.

South Africa made two changes from the line-up which beat the Netherlands in their last game, with Farhan Behardien and Parnell in for regular skipper Faf Du Plessis – suspended for one match due to a slow over-rate-


Hamilton on pole in Malaysia

Anand wins Candidates chess to set up world championship rematch with Magnus Carlsen

KHANTY MANSIYSK (RUSSIA): Five-time world champion Viswanathan Anand proved all his critics wrong and won the Candidates Chess tournament after settling for a draw with Sergey Karjakin of Russia in the 13th and penultimate round on Saturday.

The tournament victory gives Anand the right to a match against Magnus Carlsen of Norway who dethroned the Indian champion at Chennai in November last year. The rematch will take place sometime in the last quarter of this year.

Anand held his own against Karjakin in the endgame that lasted more than five and a half hours. The draw helped Anand reach eight points and he benefited from the biggest upset in the tournament when top seed Levon Aronian of Armenia lost to lowest ranked Dmitry Andreikin of Russia.

On a day that saw Vladimir Kramnik avenging his earlier loss in the tournament against Veselin Topalov of Bulgaria, Shakhriyar Mamedyarov of Azerbaijan played out a draw with Russian Peter Svidler to seal the fate in Anand's favour irrespective of the results on Sunday. With Anand on eight points, Karjakin, Kramnik, Mamedyarov, Andreikin and Aronian are now 6.5 points each. Peter Svidler stand seventh on six points while Topalov remained on 5.5 to fill the last place.

In the last round, Anand meets Svidler

and the draw could be a likely result as the Indian will play with white pieces

In the game against Karjakin, Anand equalised quite easily with the Queen's gambit declined and had no troubles whatsoever in finding a thematic pawn sacrifice that made his position easier to play. However, while trying to work out the right path, Anand erred slightly and faced a difficult but possible defense when he parted with two pieces for Karjakin's rook.

The ensuing endgame was easier for Karjakin and the defence was not easy, but Anand kept finding the right moves and obtained a passed pawn on the king side that proved vital. Karjakin was aware at this point that the fight was over but he played on till 91 moves before signing the peace treaty.

Andreikin came up with a sensational performance to beat Aronian who appeared out of sorts once more. The Russian went for the Trompovsky opening as an early surprise and got a comfortable endgame once the queen's got traded. Aronian was saddled with the worse pawn structure and another accuracy cost him heavily as he landed in a lost rook and pawns endgame.

Kramnik had a fine victory against Topalov out of a Semi Slav defense. Playing white, Kramnik was at the top of his game for once in the tournament. Topalov made the mistake of pushing his king side pawns and Kramnik picked one of them with precise calculation. The Bulgaria posed some problems before he faced inevitable loss
